Can students solve our problems?

A new Award for university students solving the world big problems has just found winners in the UK and Fiji.

The winners of the International Green Gown Awards were announced on 30th March 2017 at the Environmental Association for Universities and Colleges' (EAUC) Annual Conference which took place at Lancaster University, United Kingdom. Winning tertiary education institutions from the regional awards in the: United Kingdom and Ireland; Australasia; French speaking regions in Europe and Canada; and the Global Universities Partnership on Environment and Sustainability (GUPES) Green Gown Awards supported by the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), went head-to-head to win these coveted International Green Gown Awards.

University of the West of England, Bristol (UK & Ireland) won the Continuous Improvement: Institutional Change Award with "Positive Footprint: Phase 2" and their inspiring project detailing their sustainability action plan from 2013-2020; Fiji National University, Fiji (Pacific) was awarded the Community Award for their "Our Climate-Smart Landscapes" project outlining watershed protection using agroforestry systems and soil conservation; and the Student Engagement Award went to a joint venture between the University of the West of England, Bristol and the University of Bristol (UK & Ireland) with their powerful cross university and cross sector partnership programme "Green Capital: Student Capital - Unleashing the power of Bristol's Students".

The bilingual Ceremony, hosted by Pauline Pingusson, Chef de projet Campus Responsables and delivery partner for Les Trophées des campus responsables, and Leanne Denby, President of ACTS and delivery partner for the Green Gown Awards Australasia, crowned the International Green Gown Awards winners with a video recording of the event available to the non-attending worldwide finalists.

A snapshot of what the judges thought about the International Green Gown Award Winners:

University of the West of England, Bristol (UK & Ireland), Continuous Improvement: Institutional Change Award with "Positive Footprint: Phase 2". Judges liked this application for its three strong facets: structure, scope and students! With its scale of impact it epitomised a whole institutional-wide approach, embracing all aspects and making it a very worthy winner. With strong methodologies and

best practice across the sector, testing new approaches and activities, it offered an array of elements for global replication."

Fiji National University, Fiji (Pacific), Community Award with "Our climate-smart landscapes: watershed protection using agroforestry systems and soil conservation to enhance community resilience to climate change in six upper watershed communities in Ba (Viti Levu) Fiji Islands". Judges thought this was a superb example of empowering a community and respecting and making use of traditional knowledge, innovations and practices. Intelligent, local-based action promoted in the local community.

University of the West of England, Bristol and the University of Bristol (UK & Ireland), Student Engagement Award with "Green Capital: Student Capital - Unleashing the power of Bristol's Students". Judges thought this a dynamic city-wide project that had it all with high levels of student engagement, curricular and extra-curricular activity, and a direct impact on graduate employability. It clearly demonstrates a sustainable model for student engagement and is a very worthy winner. Partnership is the new leadership."

The International Green Gown Awards recognise exceptional sustainability initiatives being undertaken by further and higher education institutions. The Awards are judged by an esteemed panel of sector representatives and experts in their own field. The judging criteria is based on the sustainability projects as a whole with the deciding factor being the project with the largest scale of impact.
