



# Who's the greenest of them all?! Australasia's leading sustainable universities shortlisted in the 2016 Green Gown Awards

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Today Australian and NZ institutions find out who have been shortlisted for this year's Green Gown Awards Australasia, presented by Biniris. 34 initiatives, from 17 institutions have found themselves in the running for the top sustainability honours.

Every year the Awards bring together some of the most inspirational sustainability projects from across the sector, and 2016 is no exception. With representation from across most Australian states and New Zealand, it shows that sustainability and 'being green' is continuing to gain importance and traction across our campuses.

Leanne Denby, President of Australasian Campuses towards Sustainability (ACTS) said "I'm continually inspired by the work of the sector and in particular by those who have been recognised through the Green Gown awards. Every year, the quality of the initiatives is outstanding, and indicative of the many ways in which the sector is contributing to a more sustainable society. My heartfelt congratulations to all those successful finalists. I am really looking forward to seeing everyone at the Awards night and finding out who our winners are for 2016.

All 34 finalists were chosen with the help of over 40 independent sector experts from organisations across the globe.

Of these Universities Australia, Deputy Chief Executive Catriona Jackson said the awards honoured the many staff and students who were working on sustainability initiatives across the country. "The annual Green Gown Awards recognise the commitment of Australia's universities to sustainability," she said. "The level of innovation and creativity demonstrated by the finalists is a credit to the sector."

With a big interest in carbon reduction this year, five institutions have pledged their commitment to lowering their carbon footprint. Charles Sturt University, which officially gained carbon neutrality earlier this year, along with RMIT, University of Queensland, Federation University Australia and the University of Melbourne are all hoping to take out the top gong.

The always, extremely popular student engagement category has five institutions with initiatives that are varied both in scope and geographical location. RMIT, Western Sydney University and the University of Tasmania are all hoping to impress through fair trade, inspiring student conferences and community outreach programmes. Whilst across the ditch, two NZ institutions, the University of Waikato and Victoria University of Wellington,

are hoping to impress the judges through inter-halls competitions and quirky projects such as the eco-emporium and Wow Films!

There are 10 individual finalists for three personal excellence awards – including Prof. John Dewar from La Trobe University, Prof. Lesley Hughes from Macquarie University and Prof. Paul Gough, RMIT University, all hoping to show how senior leadership and vision have helped their institutions led the way.

Winners of the student engagement, community engagement and the prestigious continuous improvement categories will then go head to head with the national winners from UK & Ireland, French-speaking Europe and Canada and the six UNEP regions of Africa, Asia and the Pacific, Latin America and the Caribbean, North America and West Asia for the international titles. The international awards will be announced in Europe in the spring of 2017.
