President's Report

Sector Overview

UK

- Recent launch of a new strategy focus on post 16 education.
- Quiet transition regarding Brexit.
- Still a strong focus and movement across the sector, particularly in carbon, procurement and modern slavery.

USA

- AASHE is about to launch a new strategy.
- There is nervous tension given the political climate at the moment.
- Uncertainty abounds.
- There is a growing focus on curriculum.

AUSTRALIA

- It's a time of change as executive and institutions struggle to understand what it means to run a university like a business.
- The conversation around carbon is growing.

2017 ACTS Overview

- Delivered the 1 day Leadership Summits, 2 day carbon management workshop and a number of member webinars.
- Continued to grow our partnerships: continued conversation with TEFMA, signed an MOU with ISSP, continued strong ties with the EAUC, ASSHE and Global Education Alliance.
- · Co-developed the SDG University Guide with the SDSN.
- Signed the SDG Accord.
- Oversaw a number of staffing changes, including the addition of a new staff member (Admin Support Officer), and a change of role for Engagement & Communications Manger to General Manager.
- ACTS strategy day saw the Board agree to change the focus of ACTS to all types of campus (in order to expand our membership base) and allowing us to highlight that we provide a collective community for mutual support.

Looking forward to 2018

- ACTS and AASHE are currently in discussion to understand how the Australasian sector can access and utilise STARS as a way to measure progress across the sector nationally and globally. STARS is currently used in 39 countries so it makes sense for us to share a common platform to tell a global impact story. STARS is a great compliment to LiFE.
- Work will also be undertaken to map the cross over between LiFE, STARS and the SDGs. We're hoping to bring this opportunity to realisation for 2018.
- ACTS is in discussions with the National Union of Students UK to deliver the Green Impact program to Australasian institutions. Looking to roll the program out to a number of universities in 2018.
- We will be offering more Professional Development opportunities, and are supporting the Executive Education for Sustainability Leadership (EESL) at Griffith University in March 2018.
